Nassella (Stipa) tenuissima

✦ **Native Perennial Ornamental Grass**



Full Sun / Part Shade **Water:** Low, very drought tolerant

1-2' Tall/Wide **Color:** Silvery Green

Thread-like grass with white seed heads summer-fall

General Information

This perennial has a beautiful wispy texture and gracefully billows in the breeze. The delicate threadlike foliage varies from shades of silver to tan colored seed heads that form in late spring. The grass may go dormant in severe heat. It prefers full sun to partial shade areas. This grass is native to Texas rocky slopes and open areas

Characteristics

Hardiness Zones: 7-9

Heat Tolerance: Very High

Size: 1 foot tall by 2 feet wide

Flowers: None

Bloom time: Spring thru fall

Leaves: Light silvery green. Simple alternate leaves with a rough to touch surface

Pests and Disease Problems

Generally, disease resistant and no known pests.

Plant Care

Mexican Feathergrass is considered a medium sized border or accent plant. Grows best in sunny locations with well drained soil. It will however tolerate partial shade, difficult soil and especially drought conditions. Should not be watered more than once per week and does not like heavy mulch. This is a low maintenance grass with self-sowing tendencies. Foliage should be left for winter interest and wildlife shelter. Shear this grass in early spring.
